New organ arrives in Llanvapley.

The organ at Llanvapley Church has given good service for a number of years and a long line of organists have worked wonders to encourage good singing from congregations large and small. Recently the organ has been showing signs of old age and has been known to stop working during a hymn to the consternation of the vicar and the congregation. The problem was patched up and the organ has "soldiered" on regardless!

Despite the organ refusing to give up, the PCC began discussions to replace the organ by something more suitable. After much internet research by our organist Robert Walker a replacement organ was found at a price which was considered to be reasonable and affordable. The organ has now arrived and was played for the first time in a service on 22nd January. It is hoped to organise an event later in February order to give people a better chance to hear what it can do.
