In the service, the Bishop spoke of recognising the challenges faced already and also of the need for more work ahead, but assured those present of the benefits of building lasting relationships through the conversations that will take place over the coming months, something which other Ministry Areas have already begun to experience. A really positive service was followed by wonderful refreshments and an enjoyable time of fellowship.




A sad footnote

Llanvapley Church supports biodiversity in its churchyard

Following a suggestion from Penny Harding the church has agreed to change its mowing practices to encourage a greater range of flowers and to

provide habitats for birds and insects. A small patch of unused grass has been selected on the eastern side of the churchyard and it is planned to make changes to mowing this season. Everyone likes to see a neat and tidy churchyard which enables visitors to appreciate what it has to offer but it is also important to ensure we all play our part in increasing and supporting wildlife.

Llanvapley Churchyard improvements.

Work on the northern entrance to the churchyard is currently in progress. The work aims to make the entrance safer to use. The steps are to be modified, a new handrail fitted and the wall is to be rebuilt. The cost of the work is £4000 plus VAT and has been mainly funded by a grant of £4,000 from the Community Green Energy Advisory Group. VAT is not recoverable on work done in the church and the Church agreed to fund the VAT part of the costs.

Christmas in Llanvapley

On Friday 9th December a large crowd of villagers assembled near the entrance to the playing field to witness the switching on of the Christmas lights. It was a very jolly occasion with lots of singing followed by refreshments in the pavilion. Thanks go to Neal Smith for setting up the Christmas lights and the laser lights, Pete and Gen Marchant for the mulled wine, those who contributed food, the community council for funding the purchase of the tree and the lights and finally the county council for providing electricity free of charge. Llanvapley Walking Group



An old newspaper cutting links Llanvapley and Newport County

If you ever have to sort out lots of old paperwork you often come across little bits of history. Marilyn Hughes came across a scrap of an old newspaper from 1958 amongst her mother's papers. This was from the South Wales Argus and featured this drawing of Llanvapley Church by Fred Hando. Fred Hando was awarded an MBE in 1953 for services to education and to Monmouthshire, and by then his words and drawings had been a regular feature in the Argus for a number of years, as they would be until just days before his death, in February 1970. In 2014 Fred's first cousin once removed, David Hando, president of Newport County AFC, retired teacher, and former Newport councillor, published a book about his 'Uncle' Fred. In an attempt to ask for permission to publish the image below, I discovered David died in January of this year and many tributes have appeared in the press. Chris Barber, local historian and author, has published books about Fred Hando and his journeys around the county. Llantilio, Llanvertherine and Penrhos are all mentioned but Llanvapley seems to have been missed out despite Fred visiting the village.

The Garden in February

One of the first signs of life in our garden are tiny little round, golden yellow balls which slowly emerge like buttercups surrounded with a bright green ruff. In time they stand proud and sparkle in the winter sunshine. These are the Winter Aconites. They came from my late sister's garden in Northhamptonshire and were planted underneath a huge copper beech. In truth it is not an aconite at all and is more related to the common buttercup being of the Ranunculaceae genus, and its proper name is *Eranthis heymalis* meaning winter flowering. Like the true aconitum, Monkshood, it is



poisonous and has been used in the distant past against asthma attacks and an anti – arrhythmia for atrial fibrillation. *Eranthis* from the Greek 'ar' meaning 'spring' and *Anthos* meaning 'flower', it symbolizes hope, rebirth and new beginnings and is indeed a cheerful little plant. It comes from France, Italy and Yugoslavia, whereas the *Eranthis cilicicus* which has narrower leaves and a larger flower, comes from Turkey, Northern Iraq and Afghanistan. It is one of the woodland plants that William Robinson and Gertrude Jekyll liked to use in the more informal naturalised gardens, after the fashion for carpet bedding waned in the early 20th century. *Eranthis hyemalis* has been growing in this country for centuries and is now rare in the wild, but if you can get it going in your garden, it will reap rich rewards at a time of year when there is little around to cheer. They say it likes a well drained alkaline soil and is happy under the canopy of deciduous trees, particularly horse chestnuts. Ours are planted under a magnolia and our soil is not alkaline but verges on the acidic but they are beginning to seed themselves. It is no use planting them when they are dry, as like showdrops, they prefer being planted 'in the green' meaning when they are either in flower or just after they have flowered. Vita Sackville West wrote that it is better to transplant seedlings than to try to plant mature plants, as they like to be left undisturbed. I was given a box full of plants which had sown themselves in a flower bed and were still in flower, and planted them about 10 years ago, and since then have dug up a few and split them just after flowering to get them going. What I am aiming for is a carpet of them interspersed with snowdrops. Gardening is sometimes a bit of a waiting game, but we are slowly getting there!

What is the Alexander Technique?

We had some friends to stay before Christmas, and it was such a joy to watch their young children playing – with the ease and spontaneity which of course we all possessed once! The Alexander Technique is a method that teaches you how to rediscover that ease, and can lead to improved posture, less aches and pains and better general well-being.

Nowadays, the technique is often seen as a treatment for back pain: when I tell people that I am an AT teacher, they often pull themselves up, and say something like – oh dear my posture's terrible! However, the technique is also taught widely in performing arts colleges, and increasingly in mainstream schools with an emphasis on helping young people to deal with the pressures of life. My own experience having first had lessons 30 years ago is that it helped me deal with work related back pain, and avoid a recurrence, and also manage performance anxiety and stressful situations in a more positive way.

The technique was devised by a Tasmanian actor called F M Alexander in the early 20th century. Mr Alexander suffered recurrent bouts of laryngitis, often exacerbated by performing on stage. He realised eventually that the cause was not medical, but chronic tension in his neck affecting both his voice and breathing. He developed a method to prevent this chronic tension so that he no longer had problems when speaking, and his longstanding respiratory problems also went away. He went on to teach many fellow actors and well-known people of the day like George Bernard Shaw, Lily Langtry and Aldous Huxley.

A course of lessons with an Alexander Technique teacher can give you the skills to recognise habitual patterns of movement and ways of being that might actually be having a negative impact on your health, and rediscover the freedom of movement that we all had as young children. As a taster, I will be offering a 3-week introductory course at the Community Centre in Abergavenny starting on the 23rd February. If this sounds of interest, please give me a ring, or email.

A typical member's garden!

From your County Councillor

I love the first signs of Spring - lambs, snowdrops and earlier sunrises - but over the last month we have also had periods of extreme cold and a few days of potential flooding. As the rivers were rising, council staff and emergency services were on 24/7 standby, ready to evacuate residents in Monmouth and Skenfrith if needed. Fortunately, there was only limited flooding and the council quickly turned to clearing up the mess left by all the water.



One of the impacts of cold and rain is on our roads. All over the ward, residents have been contacting me about potholes and crumbling verges. I report every case to the highways team, but I'm conscious that they don't have the capacity to repair them all and so the waiting list is growing. Given the impending cuts to council budgets, the situation is likely to get worse.

Because of rising inflation and increased demand for some council services, the council has faced a potential £26 million shortfall for 23/24 if it is to do the same as this year. Increased support from the Welsh government has reduced that gap to around £11 million. The Labour administration is proposing to address the gap by increasing council tax by 5.95% and reducing spending in a number of areas. There is no easy answer to balancing the books and every choice will make some unhappy. My main concern is that big cuts to the social care budget will affect some of our most vulnerable residents.

At the last council meeting, I joined with Independent and Conservative councillors to vote down Labour's proposed '*Community and Corporate Plan*' which sets out their priorities for the council until the next election in 2027. While I thought the plan takes us in the right direction, it did not provide enough specifics on what they want to achieve and what they would prioritise if hard choices are needed. Given this, we could not support the plan. I am meeting with the leaders of all other parties later this week to see if we can work together to produce a better plan.

The Village Alive Trust Ymddiriedolaeth y Pentre Byw

Friends - I thought it long overdue to give you an update on the Village Alive Trust's project to conserve St Teilo's Church, Llanarth, for community use.

Firstly, our initial Expression of Interest to the National Heritage Lottery Fund in the Summer was not successful, there are several reasons why, I believe. For example, demand is outstripping supply of money to Wales as regards NHLF; some projects need extra funding post Covid; the restricted Expression of Interest form could not do justice to the breadth of the project and likely community benefit and the NHLF committee did not, we feel, consider the true calibre of our Trustees when it comes to being able to handle governance, cash flow etc. for a big money project. We feel some firming up of outcomes and wider publicity on the benefits of the project, and ability of Trustees, may be needed before we submit again.

So, we have gone back to basics!

The Rev. Jean Prosser has stepped back from the day to day board meetings and research for the project, but continues as Trust Company Secretary. The four Trustees, David Binding, Vivienne Morgan Jones, Ken Prandy and myself, plus Eric Evans and Edward Holland of Holland Heritage make up the Project Board. We will be meeting with Monmouthshire County Council officers involved in planning and community issues in January in the hope that they can add weight and knowledge to the project. All named partner groups will also help our case. This meeting is being arranged by Chris Jones, a 'place maker' and consultant, who is acting as a critical friend to the project. We aim also to apply to the Architectural Heritage Fund for a development grant to build on the previous feasibility study, and further meetings with interested user groups. Adam Hitchings, of AHF, is very supportive so we hope that grant help should be attainable next year.

I hope that this brief update reassures you that we are still busy working on achieving our aims, despite Covid setbacks and difficult times regarding grants. Thank you for your continuing support.
