


St. James the Elder, Llanvetherine Harvest Festival

Silence for personal reflection. Bible readings and short prayers. A peaceful, candlelit atmosphere. The goal is to create calm space to pray and feel close to God.)

Llanvapley Churchyard and the Village

Thursday 30 October, 7pm Llanvapley Pavilion

Join us for an engaging lecture by Les Taylor, Churchwarden, exploring the history of Llanvapley through the stories found in its churchyard. A fascinating way to discover more about the village's past and people.

This is a fundraising event, and we kindly suggest a donation of up to £10. Your entry includes a glass of wine, beer, or a soft drink.



During my research about the churchyard I was contacted by a member of the village whose daughter had uncovered some interesting objects on sale on eBay. These consisted of two 1/2 Plate Glass Negatives of Llanvapley Church.

A 1/2 plate glass negative is a photographic negative, created by coating a sheet of glass with a light-sensitive emulsion,. They were used from the mid-19th to early 20th centuries, provided a high-resolution and detailed negative. The asking price was £29.95.

I believe the photographs were taken to be used in a leaflet which was produced in the early years of the last century by the vicar of Llanvapley.



Community News In the Spotlight


In this month's edition of The New Times the spotlight has fallen on a newish resident of Penrhos. But how well do we really know **Sue Raynor**? TNT tried to find out more by putting her 'In the Spotlight'.

Preface

Hello, I'm Sue and I am the Compiler of the TNT. Les, our esteemed Editor, has cajoled me into being 'In the Spotlight' (even though I didn't want to be) as our intention is to revive this popular piece. So here goes....



David and I moved into our little slice of Monmouthshire heaven from Esher, Surrey, at the end of March 2021. We had viewed the house on a foggy, cold day in early January and had no idea of how





We live between Penrhos and Wernrheolydd and love everything about rural life: the change of seasons, the fresh air, the light, the rainbows, the views, observing the farming calendar first hand and all the other joys of country living. Our family and friends from far and wide also love what we love when they visit.

But it's the people that make the place and we are blessed with charming neighbours (I hope they're reading this) and also good friends.

Is it too quiet where you live after living inside the M25 for so many years?

'Absolutely not' is the short answer. But I must say that it was a bit tricky getting to know people when we moved in as we are such a spread out community so I did three things to overcome splendid isolation.

Firstly I joined the Llantilio Crossenny WI and have made so many lovely friends there- strong, interesting women one and all. I also went to church at St Teilo's and St Cadoc's. I don't want to make Rev Heidi blush but her warm and inclusive manner made me feel so welcome. I've met wonderful people in both congregations. The third thing I did was to join the volunteer team in North Monmouthshire. I started volunteering during Covid and caught the bug. I enjoy every aspect of being a volunteer and think that the local Community Centres in Monmouthshire do fantastic and invaluable things. I volunteer at Bridges in Monmouth and, again, it's the people that drew me in.



Are you working at the moment?

I finally retired in 2018. I always wanted to be a teacher and started work in south London comprehensives at a time of considerable unrest in society. The 1981 Brixton Riots, overt racism and other social injustices directly impacted on the schools that I worked in. As a teacher in challenging schools and throughout my career I was motivated by my firm belief that education is the only way to break the cycle of poverty in this country. It was very hard but intensely rewarding work.

After I finished as a headteacher I was self-employed for a number of years and had a range of contracts, often supporting schools in special measures. I particularly enjoyed coaching younger colleagues who wanted to become headteachers of the most challenging schools on a Department of Education programme called 'Future Leaders'.

Have you ever met anyone famous?

I met many politicians when I was a Headteacher but I've locked those memories away in the filing cabinet of my mind. David had a relation who was an actor with the RSC so we've met various famous thespians in our time but I won't name drop those here! However, when I was a deputy headteacher in Richmond upon Thames one of the parents was Trevor Peacock who played Jim Trott in "The Vicar of Dibley"! He was an 'older parent', often looked frazzled, sadly departed now.

When I was a young teacher in Tooting, the late Queen Mother came to visit the school. The route that she was to take through the school was cleaned and painted, the Ty Bach was fully refurbished and pot plants appeared out of nowhere to provide a bit of greenery. Incomprehensibly the plants disappeared the day after her visit but the paint job remained. She was a gracious and interested visitor to this London Boys Comprehensive in the raw early 1980s. (But Her Majesty never used the throne).

Les asked me a lot of questions but this is all I have time for right now. It was actually a pleasure to sit and think awhile so if you're asked to be 'In the Spotlight' please say YES!

Llantilio Crossenny WI

As the dry summer drew to a close and the harvest was taken in, Llantilio Crossenny WI returned to its usual meeting place at Llanvapley Pavilion.

We caught up with each other after a busy summer of jolly outdoor gatherings and started with the business of the day. Amongst other things we were pleased to note that we raised over £100 at our annual picnic for the WI charity, Association of Country Women Worldwide. The charity supports women in rural poverty around the world who are setting up self- help projects, a worthwhile and fitting cause for our members.

Once the business was concluded, we enjoyed an evening of 'Dance, Dance, Dance' with Claire and her 'Sassy Steppers, HipHopper Showstoppers' ably supported by Johnnie on the music. The steps were demonstrated and then, with a few creaks and sighs, we were up and doing the moves to music or some of us remained seated and did chair dancing! This was a fun and entertaining night but exhausting (in a good way!).

Footnote: Claire and Johnnie run a fun class called "The Charleston' at the Bridges Centre, Monmouth, every Thursday at 10.00am. Everyone is welcome to go along and give it a try- it's guaranteed fun and very good for mental agility and coordination.

Talking of fun, nineteen of our members continued their weekly rehearsals for 'Gwent's Got Talent' at Usk Memorial Hall on the 11th October at 7.00pm. Our musical theatre piece has been a challenge for most of us but hopefully we will entertain and amuse our audience.

The month closed with a Saturday morning of First Aid Training with the very knowledgeable and experienced ex ambulance driver Pete Cook, based at Chepstow.

The national WI resolution for this year is "Bystanders Can Be Lifesavers" with a focus on CPR. Research by the St John's Ambulance Brigade shows that women who go into cardiac arrest in public are far less likely to receive CPR from Bystanders than men. This is for a variety of reasons but the fact is that more than 8,200 women would have survived a heart attack if they had



been given the same treatment as men between 2003 and 2013. Our training included learning about the correct CPR technique for adults, children and babies and using a defibrillator. One interesting and reassuring fact is that once a 999 call is made reporting a heart attack, a network of support is activated by the emergency services including a local contact bringing the defibrillator to your location. This was a really worthwhile way of spending a Saturday morning.
