

# News from the Four Churches St. Cadoc's, Penrhos

## A Walk in the Graveyard at St Cadoc's

After the service at St Cadoc's this week, I ventured into the graveyard with Richard Price, Churchwarden of many years standing, to look for two Commonwealth War Graves (CWG).



The image above shows a Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) casualty registration report form. The form is used to record details of a Commonwealth military service member who died during one of the World Wars.

According to the CWGC website (cwgc.org) "Servicemen commemorated in UK war graves usually died fighting in aerial combat in battles over the home front. Others drowned in coastal

waters. If they were wounded or came down with disease while on active duty, they may have been transported back to the UK where they may have died in hospital or while convalescing in private".

There are two Commonwealth war graves in the churchyard, both casualties of WW2 and both of whom served in the Royal Welch Fusiliers. Their records are to be found on the CWG website, along with the records of 1.7 million Commonwealth men and women who are commemorated in graveyards and memorials across the world, buried where they fell.

The gravestone of M. R. Lloyd showed that he died on 18<sup>th</sup> September 1940. Perhaps he had been injured in the evacuation of the British Expeditionary Force at Dunkirk in May/June 1940?

The gravestone of W. J. J. Gunter recorded his death as 26<sup>th</sup> July 1944. Again, I could only surmise what happened but it may be that he was involved in the early days of the push into France following the D Day Landings and was repatriated with serious injuries?

According to Richard both men lived on local farms and one can only wonder with awe and sadness how fate dealt them such a twisted hand – to leave rural Monmouthshire to fight in a war and then to lose their lives. Eight men from Penrhos were killed in the two world wars and on Remembrance Sunday we will honour their sacrifice and pray for peace in this precarious but beautiful world of ours.

## Sometimes a warm welcome is just not enough!

Llanvapley Church is the smallest of the four churches in the group, and in theory, should be the easiest to keep warm. Visitors and worshippers are always given a warm welcome, though we are aware that the church itself is sometimes not as warm as we would like. The building is equipped with several convector heaters, which help to take the chill off, but they need to be switched on well before services to make a real difference.

The weather on Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> October was quite different: the first service took place on an autumnal day, while the second felt much more wintry. Combined with the clocks going forward, this made the church feel a little less comfortable. After some discussion



about how best to keep everyone warm, it was suggested that we provide throws for members of the congregation to use during services. This idea will be trialled, and we hope it will make a noticeable difference.

## Llanvapley Churchyard and the Village

Llanvapley Church Committee would like to extend thanks to everyone who attended the fund-raising talk on 30<sup>th</sup> November at Llanvapley Pavilion which raised £180 for church funds. Special thanks also go to the Llanvapley Sports and Social Association for kindly providing the venue and assisting with the event.

During the evening, guests learned about several notable graves in the churchyard and the fascinating history of the Townshend family, who were part of village life for nearly a century.



The evening concluded with a call to support a proposed 16 mph speed limit in the village — an idea first suggested by Revd. Townshend in 1933, who estimated that such a measure could save 6,000 lives each year!

## **Bell Ringing at Llantilio Crossenny**

#### A visit by bell ringers from Nottinghamshire

On Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> October 23 the Trent Valley Association of bell ringers visited Llantilio and everyone in the village wanted to know what was going on! The team performed a "5184 Consett Surprise Major" which took 2 hours and 36 minutes to complete. Llantilio Bell Ringers would like to thank the Trent Valley team for its donation of £40 to the tower funds.



## The Church Organ in Llantilio is now working!

St Teilo's Church has two organs: a modern electronic organ, used for services and located on the left side of the nave, and an older pipe organ, now unused, situated under the tower arches. The electronic organ, an early 21st-century digital instrument, produces sound through speakers. The pipe organ, built in 1887 by W.G. Vowles of Bristol, represents a much older

tradition dating back to ancient Greek times. Vowles also built the organ at St David's, Llanddewi Skirrid, in 1882.



After about fifteen years of disuse, St Teilo's old pipe organ was tested on 18 October 2025 to see if it still functioned. After a slow and creaky start, the electric blower came to life, disturbing spiders and mice in the process. Despite its long neglect and lack of tuning or maintenance, the organ was found to be fully operational—old and out of practice, but still working. The church committee would like to thank Phil Norman from Llanddewi Rhydderch for his support in this project. 

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# Community News In the Spotlight

#### Hello everyone,

I'm Jeremy Pearce and I live at Waunglas with my long suffering wife, Lizzie, along with our dear old cat, Blodwyn. Sue asked if I would be In the Spotlight for the November edition of the TNT as it is the month of remembrance and she knows of my voluntary work with The Imperial War Museum.

#### Tell me how you came to live in Llantilio Crossenny?

I was born in East Dulwich, South London to Welsh parents. My father, Roy, was from Dowlais, Merthyr Tydfil and my mother, Bridget, a local girl from Raglan. They went to London independently and met at the London Welsh Club, Grays Inn Road. After a 32 year career in the Metropolitan Police, having



reached the rank of Inspector and together with my mother, who was teaching in a tough South London primary school, both retired and re-located to Llantilio Crossenny in 1984.

#### Are you working at the moment?

In 2017, having followed in my father's footsteps, I also retired from the Metropolitan Police after 31 years' service. I was fortunate to have served with some great people and have many cherished memories. I acquired many skills along the way including public order training, Licensed Search officer, Advanced driver, motorcyclist both road and off road. My last 5 years were at the Palace of Westminster (Houses of Parliament) employed on the Counter Terrorism Search Team. We were responsible for internal security and each day the House sat a thorough search would be conducted of the Lords and Commons chambers. It was an honour and a privilege to have access to all areas of the estate, including the roof spaces and basements, which was restricted for most, including MPs. It was an incredibly interesting building to explore and packed with so much history. On one memorable day we were conducting the search of the Commons and a colleague of mine had finished checking under the Speaker's chair and had re assembled it, but not quite as properly as it should have been. Later that morning John Bercow was seen disappearing down the back of the chair as the seat collapsed. We beat a hasty retreat, and no persons were ever held to account.

My career ended on a rather sad note, as I was directly involved in the Westminster Terror Attack in March 2017, which resulted in the death of a friend and colleague, Keith Palmer. This and several other reasons were the catalyst for Lizzie and I deciding to sell up and relocate to Wales. We found ourselves in Llantilio Crossenny and haven't looked back. I occasionally have to pinch myself and tell myself how lucky I am. We both love it here. Lizzie has now retired from the police where she was working in a very stressful environment in Counter Terrorism. She now enjoys her time at Bridges, Monmouth, where she can be found frothing the coffee in the cafe or putting a smile on the faces of the day residents.

I now volunteer with the Imperial War Museum.

#### What does your role as a volunteer for IWM involve?

I've been a volunteer at the Imperial War Museum for 9 years. My roles include online researching and updating the War Memorials Register, which currently holds over 90,000 memorials in the UK. This involves seeking memorials and adding them to the register. As well as volunteering at Duxford twice a year for the Battle of Britain and Summer airshows, I also get up to the Imperial War Museum in Lambeth once a month and do some face-to-face volunteering with the public. It's an incredibly fulfilling and humbling experience whilst engaging with some of the visitors who pass through the door.

I have just commenced another role which is a pilot project exploring AI and its ability to assist digitising the 11 million photographs held by the Imperial war Museum

#### Where did your interest in the World Wars come from?

I spent my formative years growing up in Biggin Hill, Kent. There, the RAF base played a pivotal role during the Battle of Britain in the defence of London and the South East and the very real threat of invasion. My interest in aviation and the military stemmed from these early links to the airfield. My primary and secondary schools neighboured the airfield, and we therefore had grandstand views of the Spring and Summer airshows.

#### Why is remembering war important?

As we approach Remembrance in November, it's a time of reflection and to honour those who have served or still serving to defend our democratic freedoms and way of life. It's not glorifying war but hoping for a peaceful future.

## What more needs to be done to conserve the memory of the legacy of those who sacrificed their lives fighting for this country?


We need to maintain comprehensive education, create lasting tributes, and ensure their legacy is not forgotten. Establishing memorials and supporting events such as Remembrance. My volunteering role often lends an ear to personal stories and accounts from visitors to the museum. Those families should be encouraged to share their own history.

#### Do you have any other interests?

Rugby was my passion for many years until my knees said, "No more". These days I cycle and belonged to Dulwich Paragon Cycling Club when I resided in London. One of my most memorable rides, and indeed the hardest thing I've done was a sportive in the Dolomites, Italy in 2018. It was beautifully scenic but a brutal 85 miles and 15,000ft of climbing. I'm a qualified British Cycling Ride Leader and lead gentle rides around Abergavenny. Utilising the old tram roads and canal paths, it's aimed at those new or returning to cycling. They're predominantly traffic free, too! British Cycling 'Let's ride' website if you're interested. (Shameless plug).

I do a little re-enacting, mainly WWII German paratroopers (Falschirmjager) centring around the Normandy and Monte Casino campaigns. The interest came from wanting to learn more about WWII from a German perspective.

I also dabble in a bit of amateur photography.
