In the book Trystan explores his experience of suffering and considers how God can redeem and transform pain and disability, and explores how common experiences of pilgrimage are echoed in the challenges of our life journeys. Along the way, the reader is led to consider the journeys we all face, as we search for God's presence and hope in our joys and pains.

There is time for elegance, Heidi's unusual signature thing!

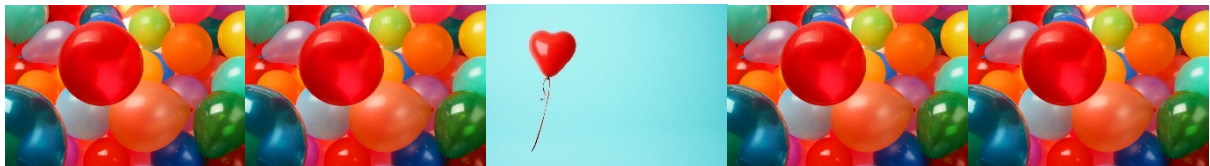
She plays organ and piano with effortless flair,

## Reflections on leading Morning Prayer: Our Journey in Faith



Marion, Ros and I were appointed lay Worship leaders last August. Several of our cohort are leading services already including Pip in Penrhos, so I felt propelled to offer to do something for the January service.

It was still the season of Epiphany and that suggested to me the theme of pilgrimage - our journey in faith. The Three Wise Men were arguably the first pilgrims, and as I pictured them walking, or on camels, the seed of an idea grew. We began the service with walking, mindful of one step after another, making our short journey from the entrance of the church to the Chancel where we sat. We were led by three wise women in the shape of Marion, Myfanwy and Ros and we walked not towards a star but the candlelight. The service began with Myf lighting the central candle around which stood three figures from our nativity - those three wise men

I hoped to have a reflective service and to involve other members of the congregation. We started with some music - John Taverner's 'Mother of God' sung by Voces 8 - This led into a period of silence where I invited everyone to be aware of the presence of God.

Apart from hymns and the Lord's prayer, we said the psalm for the day in a call and response way. Sean gave our scripture reading and then we sang 'Our Lord Hear my Prayer' the beautiful Taize song that paved the way for intercessions by Ros - and these really touched my heart.

The service concluded with 'The Journey of the Magi' by T.S. Elliot read by Heidi, a vicar's blessing and dismissal and notices from Marion.

We were a small number, and I was delighted that Pip and Les came. I personally enjoyed the service, and the experience of putting it together. I realised how much thought was required in the planning, the making of the service sheet, and practical arrangements on the day. I ran everything by Heidi of course, and she came up with one of my favourite poems 'The Journey of the Magi' to read. I was keen to involve other members of the congregation and thanks to all of those who contributed: The three wise women! Heidi and Margaret who coped with the need to transfer from the organ to piano because of electric problems! It was lovely to have Sean there, and Lin who kept us on track with 'Oh Lord hear my prayer'. As usual Marion provided good coffee and she and Ros provided cakes. And a big thank you to those who came, put up with the cold, and joined me in morning prayer with a difference!

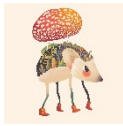

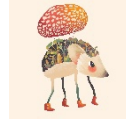

## Eco Church Update – Creation Care in Practice



This season we have continued to make small but meaningful contributions to caring for God's creation in our local environment. Two hedgehog houses have been purchased and will be placed in sheltered areas of the churchyard to provide safe nesting and hibernation spaces. Hedgehogs are now listed as vulnerable in the UK, largely due to habitat loss and human activity, so offering secure refuges is a simple yet tangible way to support this declining native species.

A new bird feeder will be installed to provide supplementary food for garden birds, particularly during colder and leaner months when natural resources can be limited. Feeding birds not only supports their wellbeing but also encourages closer observation and appreciation of the diversity of species sharing our space.

We again participated in the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch, joining thousands of households across the country in this important citizen science project. The count was undertaken in challenging weather again, wind and rain, which meant most songbirds remained hidden, with jackdaws and pigeons being the only birds observed during the hour. Even so, our participation contributes valuable data to national monitoring of bird populations and reminds us how weather and climate patterns affect wildlife behaviour.

These small acts reflect our commitment to stewardship, responding to the biblical call to "tend and keep" the earth (Genesis 2:15). By creating safe habitats, observing wildlife, and contributing to wider ecological understanding, we seek to honour God's creation with attentiveness, humility, and care.

Cultivating a yew hedge is a rewarding endeavour, especially when it carries the legacy of a cherished tree. After a tree preservation order was lifted on our cherished yew trees in the churchyard, I was legally permitted to take cuttings before the tree was felled due to health and safety concerns. This act ensures that the tree's lineage continues, providing a habitat for birds to nest and feed, and contributing to the ecological balance.



Yew hedges are known for their dense foliage, which offers shelter and food for various wildlife, enhancing biodiversity. Growing these cuttings on my windowsill allows me to nurture them in a controlled environment, although it requires patience as yew trees are very slow growing. Over time, hopefully, these cuttings will develop into a robust hedge, continuing the legacy of the original tree and supporting local wildlife.

Yew trees often have Tree Preservation Orders (TPOs) due to their significant ecological, historical, and cultural value. These trees are known for their longevity and can live for thousands of years, making them important biological and historical monuments. Yew trees provide essential habitats for various wildlife, including birds and insects, contributing to biodiversity. Additionally, their dense foliage offers shelter and food for many species, enhancing the ecological balance. TPOs are implemented to protect these trees from deliberate damage and destruction, ensuring their preservation for future generations.
